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A summary of our Pupil Premium Grant Funding

The Pupil Premium Grant Funding is an additional amount of money the school receives based on the number of children who attend our school and receive free school meals. Schools are free to decide how best to spend this additional money to best support the raising of attainment for our most vulnerable pupils.

In 2018-19 the school received £74,805 in pupil premium allocations

In 2019-20 the school will hope to receive £75,840



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In 2018/19 the pupil premium grant was used in a variety of ways. These included:

- To maintain the additional hours of teaching assistants to ensure all classes have at least one additional adult. This maintains our commitment to deliver more personalized intervention programs for identified children across the school.
- The retention of our learning mentor in a full time capacity, to support the social/emotional and behavioral problems of some children to reduce the social barriers to learning
- The learning mentor also liaises with families to provide links between families and family support services.
- The learning mentor also provides a breakfast club to vulnerable families who need help to ensure a consistent start to the school day.
- All of this has the impact of maintaining a good rate of attendance, and children ready to learn, which has impacted on our rise in academic achievement.

We have also provided extra-curricular activities and trips both in and outside school time to provide a variety of rich educational and life experiences to all our children.

In the last 12 months all children have experienced:

- A visit to Ingleton caves as a starting point for language development and literacy work
- A visit on a steam train, then a boat trip on lake Windermere. The vast majority of our pupils had never experienced either forms of transport before.
- Paid for 7 year 6 pupils to experience a residential visit where they took part in adventurous and outdoor activities..
